

The Mission of the Mobility Commission is as follows:

- A. The Mobility Commission seeks to advise staff on the creation and promotion of a multi-modal city, encouraging cleaner and safer transportation options by integrating all modes of travel by promoting transportation facilities that are planned, designed, operated, and maintained to improve the safety of mobility for all users, including bicyclists, pedestrians, wheelchairs, transit vehicles, trucks, motor vehicles, and all other transportation modes.
- B. This is accomplished through implementing the concepts of complete streets, sustainable streets, vision zero, and smart streets, and principles of engineering, enforcement, and education to create a transportation network that is safe, calm, convenient, and fully integrated for all users -- automobile motorists, pedestrians and bicyclists of any age or ability, transit vehicles and riders, freight providers, emergency responders, children, and the elderly -- in a balanced, responsible and equitable manner.

The Coronado Mobility Commission is advisory to the City Council. The duties of the Coronado Mobility Commission are as follows:

- A. Assist the City in implementing the City of Coronado Comprehensive Active Transportation Plan and Complete Streets Strategy (Active Transportation Master Plan).
- B. To investigate effective methods to comprehensively calm and slow traffic and other active transportation safety options as described in the Addendum to the Coronado Active Transportation Master Plan.
- C. Work with City staff and interested citizens to explore potential methods to reduce the impact of traffic congestion on motorists, pedestrians, cyclists, and residents.
- D. To promote convenient and cost-effective mass transportation for residents, visitors, and commuters.
- E. To investigate effective methods to maximize the efficiency and safety of the current circulation system for all participants including cyclists, pedestrians, and public transportation.
- F. Assist the City in researching, planning, and implementing complete streets, sustainable streets, vision zero, and smart streets concepts, and how to best plan for and integrate other emerging technologies, such as autonomous and electric vehicles, into the City's transportation network.
- G. To investigate, consider, and recommend events and programming that encourage safe motoring and bicycle ridership on the part of residents, visitors, and commuters to the City.

- H. To identify programs that improve the commuter experience without detracting from Coronado's quality of life.
- I. To identify quantifiable measures to assess effectiveness of new programs and their impact on climate change.
- J. To conduct such hearings and to do such other things as necessary to comprehensively address traffic, parking congestion, bicycle safety, pedestrian safety, accessibility, mass transit, and other modes of transportation in the City of Coronado.
- K. Work together with City staff to brainstorm new ideas and to evaluate whether or not proposed solutions are viable and cost-effective and, from time to time, forward its suggestions to the City Council for its review and potential implementation.
- L. To perform such duties and responsibilities as may be assigned by the City Council from time to time.
